Learning objective

To know who they are in relation to others

 family and/or religion – when it comes to
 celebrating

Religious Education Council Requirements

Resources

- Visitor to talk about their family and faith, or Persona Doll
- Digital photographs of the class members (plus a class photograph if possible)
- Paper, or paper plates
- Paints and/or crayons

Vocabulary

Church/temple/mosque/gurdwara/mandir/ synagogue and so on, club, family, friends, hobby, visitor

Key questions 🚱

Who am I? Who are my family? Who are my friends? What groups do I belong to? Do I belong to a religious group? What hobbies does my family have?

Group formation

- Whole class together
- Knee buddies within whole group
- Individual space for art work

Introduction

Greet the visitor, and ask them to explain who they are. Ask them to talk about their family, their

Success Criteria

- To explain their family unit and its activities
- To express an interest in other family situations and activities

friends and what faith they belong to. If this is a Persona Doll the résumé can be kept brief!

Activities

Ask people to talk with their knee buddies about:

- family
- friends
- religious or other groups they belong to
- hobbies the family has.

Let people draw themselves on a paper plate or use a photograph centred in a large sheet of paper, and ask them to draw around this central head those people they are in contact with: friends at school, friends at home, family, friends at clubs or places of worship.

Plenary

Look at a sample of the pictures. Consider how many different people make up your 'group' (using the class photograph as a prompt, if available).

Affirm all the different things people do: write a 'prayer' of thanks for these opportunities and add it to the 'Think about' display.

Differentiation

Everyone should work to the best of their ability.

Random pairings should enable everyone to talk about their own experiences.

Extension

Add the pictures to the 'Think about' display, or place them all around the room for continued work.
